Mangroves are among the best carbon stores >> This infographic from the Center for International

Leaders for Nature India, a network of sustainabilityminded business in Asia, collaborated with MFF to conduct a master class highlighting coastal issues in India. Forestry Research shows how saving mangroves in countries such as Indonesia will make a big difference to climate change.

The aim of the master class was to work towards a government-business-community alliance for on-the-ground action for conservation of the marine environment in the country's east coast.

More than one in six mangrove species worldwide are in danger of extinction due to coastal development and other factors and it is estimated that in India and Southeast Asia around 80% of all mangrove area has been lost over the past 60 years >>
